Summary

I have been living and teaching in Korea since 2008 and I love it. Prior to coming to Korea I taught remedial English at a local community college while I completed an MA (in English). I also taught a small group of special needs students at a local high school as a member of the AVID program. Since arriving in Korea I have taught kindergarten, elementary, middle school, and now, finally, at the university level. One of my strengths is thus the breadth of my experience, having taught K through college in my time as a teaching professional.

I am passionate about teaching and love the classroom experience. One of the things I love most about teaching is that it affects you personally in very profound ways. Teaching high risk kids in high school and at the college taught me not to take lightly the impact education has on the lives of the students. Many of them changed before my eyes, and this, in turn, changed me. Teaching ESL in Korea, a vastly different educational culture, has taught me how valuable English skills are in the world today. The societal investment in education in Korea, both temporally and financially, is staggering. And teaching children taught me humility, patience, and, yes, love.

In March of 2011 I was awarded a position as an English faculty member at DongA University, a private institution with three campuses and 20,000 students. I teach 19th and 20th century American literature, English conversation, composition, and speech courses. I have taught special seminars on a variety of subjects, including Mythology and Public Presentation.

I have always sought to make discussion and dialogue central to the learning process, in doing so seeking to build a learning community where learning becomes an ongoing act of collective discovery. A classroom functions best when everyone, including the instructor, learns together.
